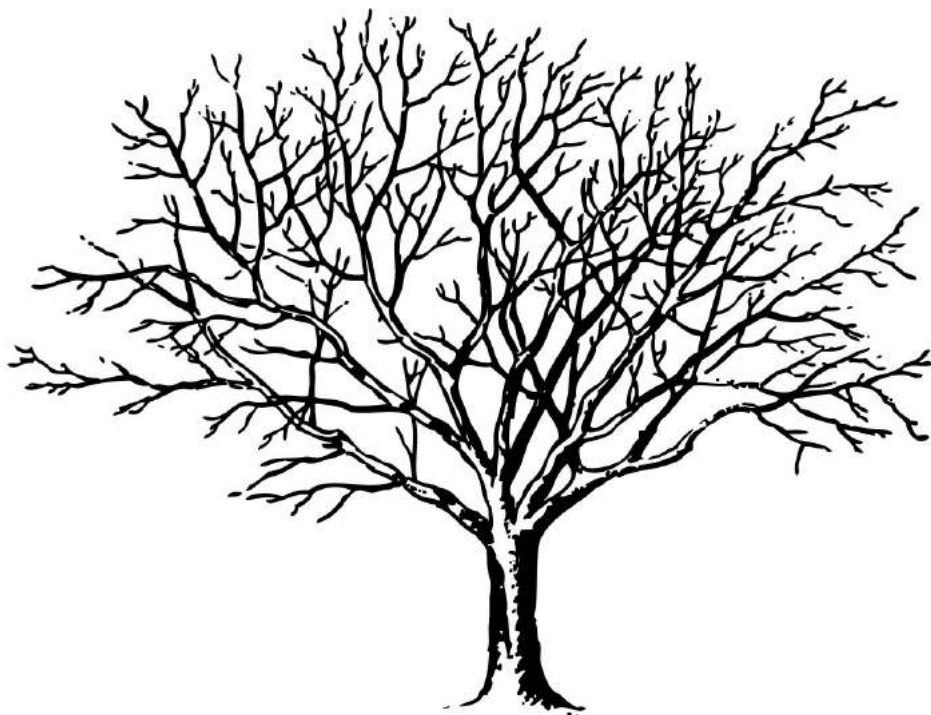

Roman Romance

I love February! It's the shortest month, spring is in the air, Christmas weight is finally shifting and my finances are returning to normal. And, best of all, there's Valentine's Day on February 14th! And who doesn't like a bit of romance, flowers and chocolates?

But St Valentine's life wasn't particularly romantic. He was a Roman priest at the time of Emperor Claudius II. Claudius had issued an edict prohibiting young people from marrying as he felt that unmarried soldiers fought better if they weren't worried about their families' futures if they died. St Valentine, however, felt it was important for couples to be able to marry so he secretly performed many ceremonies and also helped Christians escape the severe persecution of the time. He was eventually caught but, whilst incarcerated in prison, ended up discussing the validity of Jesus with one of his judges, Asterius. Intrigued, the judge bought his adopted blind daughter to Valentine, promising to do whatever he told him to if she was healed. Valentine prayed and the girl's sight was restored. The judge was so amazed and joyful that he, his family and forty four household members all became Christians and he also freed all the inmates imprisoned for their Christian faith.

Eventually however, in 269ad, Valentine was sentenced to a three part execution of beating, stoning and decapitation. But his courageous stand for the right to love has long been remembered. He believed the joys of relational love with a partner and relational love with Jesus Christ were worth dying for - and that belief is still celebrated today!

From the Organ Bench

If you want to be famous - not to mention the royalties - write a seasonal song which will be popular every year. Irving Berlin managed it (with *White Christmas* and *Easter Parade*): no wonder he lived to be 101.

This month let's celebrate a hymn-writer who achieved the same feat, although she never sought royalties. Cecil Frances Humphreys was born in Dublin in 1818, the

daughter of an Army officer. In 1860 she married William Alexander, a parish priest in the north of Ireland who became Bishop of Derry in 1867. From then until her death in 1895 Mrs Alexander, a well-educated woman much influenced by John Keble, led the life of a bishop's wife while also writing a great many poems and hymns.

Her best-loved hymns were written in her twenties and published in *Hymns for Children* (1848). The words of the Creed are difficult for young children, and Mrs Alexander sought to bring them to life. Thus 'Maker of heaven and earth (*All things bright and beautiful*), 'Born of the Virgin Mary' (*Once in royal David's city*), and 'Was crucified, dead and buried' (*There is a green hill far away*). In that last one, she originally wrote 'Beside a city wall' but then changed 'beside' to 'without', which although it means 'outside', has thus confused generations of children into wondering why the green hill would have needed a city wall in the first place.

Despite there being many good modern hymns and songs which children like to sing, Mrs Alexander's hymns have never lost their popularity, especially at Christmas and Passiontide. Her voice is also often heard on Trinity Sunday, when we sing her strong, vigorous translation of the traditional 'St. Patrick's Breastplate' - *I bind unto myself today / The strong name of the Trinity*.

But my personal favourite is *Jesus calls us: o'er the tumult / Of our life's wild, restless sea. / Day by day, his sweet voice soundeth, / Saying 'Christian, follow me'*. This was written for St. Andrew's Day, but can be sung at any time since Jesus is forever calling us to follow him. Its appeal to me is greatly enhanced by the glorious, uplifting Victorian tune that it's sung to - *St. Andrew*, written for it by Edward Thorne (1834-1916).

People can and do pick holes in Mrs Alexander's theology and use of language. But if her words, and the sincere Christian belief that inspired them, are remembered by people from childhood onwards, then something of that belief is still there. That was her achievement - worth far more than royalties.

PLASTIC FREE WINCANTON

Open Meeting

On the cutting edge of recycling, pioneer Nick Stillwell of Frome will tell of his company Storm Board's success in turning "unrecyclable plastics" into products.

All are welcome

Campaigners from Mendip and South Somerset paid a visit to Storm Board, part of Protomax, an innovative plastic recycling company in Frome. We met the founder, Nick Stillwell, who explained what they do and their approach to making plastic recycling into a sensible business proposition.

The company can recycle any type of plastic, hard or soft, and turn it into a vast range of board based products - construction hoarding, tables, cabinets, chairs, worktops, planters and emergency housing. Their business model is based on a closed loop, which turns waste plastic, supplied by an organisation, into a product that may be used by that organisation. The company have already worked with Frome Town Council to turn its plastic waste into public noticeboards, and have had contracts with several major supermarkets and construction firms.

Potentially the company provides, in part at least, a solution to the huge global problem of plastic pollution in the ocean, highlighted by the BBC's Blue Planet 2 and Drowning in Plastic programmes hosted by Sir David Attenborough and Liz Bonnin.

Nick had just returned from Italy after demonstrating how to use waste to build refugee housing on site. To do this they bargaged the Po River and collected plastic waste which they proceeded to process into the raw material from which they created a refugee shelter. The process provides an alternative to plywood panels for hoarding construction sites and events. Millions of panels a year are made from processed timber, mostly from shipped China or Brazil, which all end up buried in landfill sites. The company is working to replace this with recycled plastic, which is reusable and recyclable and so saves money for their clients.

The whole process was inspiring and provides a glimpse into how we, locally, may do our bit to address the plastics issue. The closed loop model transfers responsibility to those people who use plastic...us.
