The rain has just slowed and as a final reprieve, a dusky glow is bathing my garden. The flowers are now in full bloom – roses, geraniums, daisies, lavender, calendula - and finally, after three years of waiting, the new borders are filling in, realising the vision I had when I first moved in. It's given me a lot of time to think as I've planted and watered and weeded and watched – waiting for seedlings to emerge, buds to blossom and plants to fill out. I've felt impatient and discouraged here and there, but over time, I began to see bits of hope in the growth process. It never fails to thrill to see a little seed planted deep within the soil with no light, no direct access, no way to monitor its growth - yet when it receives what it needs, abandoning its shell to grow upwards, breaking through the hard ground, making it into the light, into view, to be finally seen for what it is.

So often aspects of our lives – such as our hopes and dreams – can be much like the seed. For a season, they are buried and are so out of sight so that we might wonder if they are even still alive. This might happen when caring for another – a parent, child, or loved one – or have to prioritise another season which seemingly puts the dream on hold. Or maybe even this is 'the season' yet the growth is taking much longer than expected – for example, when hoping a new business will take off, or a home will sell, or that a relationship will turn the corner.

If you are in this state – of impatience, frustration, hopelessness – I pray this summer, as you stroll through the lanes and see the beautiful flowers, that you are filled with hope. Those dreams that may seem to have died a death may in fact yet be in the process of taking root to soon emerge. After all, the dream seeds that God places within us contain all they need to bring them to full fruition in the right time with God's help. He is a patient gardener and doesn't give up! All we have to do is trust and enjoy the gentle weeding, watering and pruning until signs of new life emerge.

From the Organ Bench

Folliott Sandford Pierpoint.

That sounds like a long-established firm of solicitors in a country town, doesn't it? Actually it's the name of a man, clearly a very saintly one. Whatever Mr and Mrs Pierpoint, citizens of Bath in our diocese, might have been thinking in naming their baby son, he grew up to write:

For the joy of human love, / Brother, sister, parent, child....

To go through life being called Folliott Sandford, and still to write those lines, calls for a very special kind of saintliness. They are from *For the beauty of the earth*, a much-loved hymn which Pierpoint (1835-1917) wrote in 1864. It's the only hymn for which he is remembered, so he joins our number of one-hit wonders. But it's a joyful hymn of thanks to God for all he gives us – beauty, love, grace and the Church itself.

For the beauty of the earth deserves a joyful, vigorous tune, and it got it when Geoffrey Shaw (1879-1943) arranged for it an English folk song which most hymn books call *England's Lane*. Geoffrey Shaw's other claim to fame is that, 100 years ago this year, as editor of the Public School Hymn Book (1919), he commissioned John Ireland to write the haunting tune which made the equally powerful words of *My song is love unknown* into one of the best-loved hymns of all.

The nearer you are to Wales, the more likely you are to sing *For the beauty of the earth* to *Lucerna Laudoniae (Lantern of Lothian)* composed by David Evans (1874-1948) as a tribute to a Scottish colleague. A lovely tune but not quite as vigorous as *England's Lane*, and it changes time-signature in the middle, something that the Welsh are better at mastering than the rest of us. Some hymn books inexplicably set the hymn to the dreary *Dix* (with which that fine hymn *As with gladness men of old* is invariably saddled).

To be remembered for one great piece of writing is better than for none at all. Folliott Sandford Pierpoint, together with Geoffrey Shaw, deserve our respect for ensuring that after singing this great hymn to *England's Lane* we can't fail to feel joyful and thankful.

CHARLTON MUSGROVE FLOWER AND PRODUCE SHOW SATURDAY 27TH JULY

As mentioned in our last reminder, we have introduced some new ideas for this year's flower show. There will be the usual classes for Vegetables and Fruit, Flowers, Flower Arrangements, Home Industries – Kitchen and Handicrafts, Photography and the Greenfingers Award for children. As we are slightly earlier in the year than in previous years the fruit and vegetable section is different, and all classes have been reduced in the hope that it will make it easier for you to choose which classes to enter!

Now to the "hands on" activities which we hope will prove extremely popular to all ages. For the children, we will have a table for 'pebble painting' which will be supervised by a local expert. Many of us in the village have had the delight of mysterious painted stones appearing overnight on our gate-posts, doorsteps, etc. which has brought much joy. We thought it would be a nice idea if the children could paint their own stone and then give it to a relative – grandparent, aunt, uncle, etc. – who in turn would place it anonymously on a neighbour's property thus propagating the joy these stones have brought. All materials will be provided and there will be no cost involved.

The second "hands on" will involve fruit and vegetable sculpting. A local expert has volunteered to run a table for those of you brave enough to have a go at transforming a cucumber into a caterpillar or a potato into a tulip! It should be really good fun and it would be great to see lots of people having a go. Once again, all materials will be provided at no cost – so just your enthusiasm will be needed.

In a bid to reduce paper waste, schedules will not be put into Newsletters this year but will be available from Kimbers Farm Shop, The Smithy, the Village Hall, Ceri Izard or Gill Adams from the 22nd June.

There will of course be the usual tea, coffee and superb selection of homemade cakes from our wonderful village bakers, plus raffle and sale of produce at 3.30 p.m.

We do hope you can come along and enjoy what we are hoping will prove to be a really fun afternoon.

Letter from the Right Reverend Ruth Worsley, Bishop of Taunton For Parish Newsletters – July 2019

Time to reflect

By the time you read this I may be a Granny! Our first grandchild is due on June 30th. Very exciting! So our holiday this month will be up in Scotland, cooling over a new-born. Let's hope he or she looks more like their parents than their grandparents.

I remember when our eldest son was born that he received a little T-shirt that said 'If you think I'm cute you should see my dad'. No prizes for guessing who gave it to him!

I wonder who people see when they look at you. I'm not speaking of the familial physiological likeness but rather whether you reflect something of the nature and character of your heavenly Father. Can people look at you and recognise you as part of the Christian family?

It's easy for us to point the finger at others and say they are hypocrites or fail to live up to the high standards of Christian faith. I have to own that as I write this, following President Trump's visit, that I find some of his views far from the Christian ones I espouse. If I allow myself I can get quite heated about the different ways in which people make Christian claims. 'Living the story of God's love' shouldn't be about taking pot shots at others but rather seeking to become more like Christ ourselves. We all fail at that.

I've been doing some reassessment of my life as I realise a new generation is entering our family. It makes you think about what really matters and how you apportion your time.
