You're Not Forgotten

During the Second World War, the US Army was forced to retreat from the Philippines. Some of their soldiers were left behind, and became prisoners of the Japanese. The men called themselves "ghosts", souls unseen by their nation. On the infamous Bataan Death March, they were forced to walk over 70 miles, knowing that those who were slow or weak would be bayoneted by their captors or die from dysentery and lack of water. Those who made it through the march spent the next three years in a hellish prisoner-of-war camp. By early 1945, 513 men were still alive at the Cabanatuan prison camp, but they were giving up hope. The US Army was on its way back, but the POW's had heard the frightening news that prisoners were being executed as the Japanese retreated from the advancing U.S. Army. Their wavering hope was however met by one of the most magnificent rescues of wartime history. In an astonishing feat, 120 US Army soldiers and 200 Filipino guerrillas outflanked 8000 Japanese soldiers to rescue the POW's.

Alvie Robbins was one of the rescuers. He describes how he found a prisoner muttering in a darkened corner of his barracks, tears coursing down his face.

"I thought we'd been forgotten," the prisoner said.

"No, you're not forgotten," Robbins said softly. "You're heroes. We've come for you."

Often in life, we can start to give up hope, to feel that God has forgotten us or our nation and abandoned us to dark and hurtful experiences. But the cross of Jesus Christ reminds us, "No, you're not forgotten" and the resurrection gives us the assurance that we too can see our rescuer face to face and be liberated from the distresses of this life. And if we want him to share, not just this life, but our future life too, we also will hear him say, "I've come for you."

From the Organ Bench

When you read this it'll be on or near All Saints' Day (1 November). This – or indeed any saint's day, is a good excuse to sing one of our best-loved hymns – all eight splendid verses of For all the saints, who from their labours rest.

The truly inspiring words are by Bishop William Walsham How (1823-1897). Like all the best bishops, William Walsham How was first a vicar, for 28 years in a parish in his native Shropshire, before accepting a bishopric, first in the East End of London, and then in the newly-created diocese of Wakefield, where he stayed until his sudden death on holiday in Ireland. He was approachable and greatly loved, and was known to many as 'the people's Bishop'. A man of great humility, he refused the offer of the bishopric of Durham, one of the most prestigious appointments in the Church of England, in favour of continuing the work he had only recently started in Wakefield.

For all the saints uses images from the Book of Revelation, especially in the closing verses. It's also rich in military language: some people object to this, but in truth they can provide great inspiration provided that one remembers that it is Christian principles, rather

than earthly land, property or power that are being fought for.

If you ever feel in need of encouragement, whatever might be going wrong, you can't fail to be uplifted by verse 5:

'And when the strife is fierce, the warfare long,

Steals on the ear the distant triumph-song;

And hearts are brave again, and arms are strong. Alleluia! Alleluia!'

We have celebrated Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) in this column before. As well as his many choral and orchestral compositions, RVW was one of the greatest collectors of folk-songs that this country has ever known – and also, according to people who worked with him, a kind, approachable man who always showed how much he appreciated people wanting to play and sing his music. Without his indefatigable energy in listening to, and writing down, melodies sung by men and women who were in extreme old age by the early 1900s, tunes like the strong melody Monk's Gate (sung to Who would true valour see by John Bunyan) and the lovely, lyrical Herongate (for It is a thing most wonderful - also the work of William Walsham How) might have been lost forever.

One of his earliest contributions to church music was his editorship of the English Hymnal, first published in 1906. In compiling this, in addition to the folk-tunes that he adapted, he wrote some tunes himself, notably *Down Ampney* (for *Come down*, *O Love divine*) and *Sine Nomine* (the one now universally sung to *For all the saints*). *Sine Nomine* ('without a name') pays tribute to the countless saints through the ages: ordinary uncelebrated people who aren't remembered by name.

RVW has a local connection, as his first published work, in 1902, was a setting of 'Linden Lea' by William Barnes (1801-86), who was born in Bagber, near Sturminster Newton, and ended his days as rector of Winterborne Came, near Dorchester (priests didn't usually retire in those days).

Without his great tune, the glorious, uplifting words of William Walsham How might not be as well-known and well-loved as they are by all who sing them. We can be thankful for both men's kindness in their lifetimes as well as their everlasting legacy of words and music.

Letter from the Right Reverend Ruth Worsley, Bishop of Taunton For Parish Newsletters – November 2019

Treasure the Earth

As I write this parish letter, we are in the midst of two weeks of action by Extinction Rebellion drawing our attention to the concerns of climate change. Following Greta Thunberg's rousing speech to the UN and the various climate strikes undertaken by young people around the world, we are becoming more aware of the dangers of neglecting such an important matter. Whether we are young and passionate about this issue or one of Boris's so-called 'crusties' and equally passionate, it seems to me that we are all called to be passionate about caring for the world God has made, and which He has entrusted to our care.

The fifth Mark of Mission calls for us to 'Treasure the Earth' or, to 'safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth'. Here in Bath and Wells we focus on placing mission and evangelism at the heart of all we do. This often means we highlight the story of Jesus and the opportunity for us to know God's grace and forgiveness in personal ways. All really important for us to know how much we are loved. However, mission and evangelism isn't just limited to those people we live amongst in the present day. St Paul speaks about how our salvation and that of the world or creation are bound up together....

The created universe is waiting with eager expectation for God's children to be revealed. It was made subject to frustration, not of its own choice but by the will of him who subjected it, yet with the hope that the universe itself is to be freed from the shackles of mortality and is to enter upon the glorious liberty of the children of God.' Romans 8: 19-21

Sometimes I hear people dismiss concerns for the world and its future as being insignificant in the light of the eternal hope we have in Christ. I think this misguided and often selfish. It's a bit like the attitude which says, 'well as long as it sees me out!...'

This month you have the opportunity to get involved yourself. On Monday 18th November at Wells Cathedral and in Christ Church, Weston-Super-Mare on Saturday November 9th, there are opportunities for you to find out more. Look on the diocesan website.

And it's not just for individual action, we as a diocese want to encourage churches to look at how they might become Eco churches in the way in which they respond in worship, theological reflection, make practical changes to their carbon footprint, and in bringing about that freedom for the whole universe to be sustained and renewed.
