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Enforced Retreat

I don't know how you're feeling about Coronavirus and all its ramifications for our lives. I've certainly been through a mixture of feelings including concern for those I love, disappointment about cancelling so much, profound gratitude for our wonderful NHS and health care professionals and relief about living in such a beautiful place. When confined to barracks, there are worse places to be than our villages!

We are all being asked to plan for a reasonably lengthy period of social distancing, and particularly if we are older. The good news is that the villages have a great group of healthy volunteers wiling to get shopping, run errands, pick up pet food and prescriptions etc. Do please use them! Simply email me on rosvashlev@hotmail.com or ring on 01747 442969 or 07482 300290 and we can make sure you have everything you need. We also have some people offering to chat on the phone so, if like me, vou live alone and sometimes get lonely, do take up this offer. We might all make new friends!

From a spiritual perspective, as people try to make sense of what's going on, there is some really unhelpful nonsense online about the virus being a punishment from God. The Bible categorically contradicts this view. Coronavirus is NOT a judgement from God and it's not His story for humanity. Jesus took all judgements and curses upon Himself when He went to the cross so that we would not have to experience them! Because of this, all destructive human actions and attitudes which lead to disease and death have been forgiven. We simply need to accept His death on our behalf to be able to receive and benefit from the cleansing, renewal and restoration that He alone brings. All of us are invited to simply receive what Jesus has done for each of us and exchange our dis-eased lives for His powerful, pure and love-filled life which cleanses and fills us with His peace and presence.

So in this imposed 'retreat' from normal life ahead, why not take some time to talk to the God who created you? He knows you and loves you even if you don't know him.

Or pick up a Bible and read one of the accounts of Jesus in the New Testament. One of my favourites is the Gospel of Mark which is only short and reads like a mission impossible action story!

Or join the millions around the world who are praying. There is a prayer in this newsletter which the local church is praying over all people in the Benefice and surrounding villages. Praying together is powerful.

Or simply rest in His presence and breathe deeply of His love and breathe out all your fears as you yield to Him. He promises to meet everyone whose heart seeks Him.

The Apostle Paul, who endured extreme trials in his life, writes something really helpful for us at this time:

Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done. Then you will experience God's peace which exceeds anything we can understand. His peace will guard your hearts and minds as you live in Christ Jesus."

May God bless you and your families. Rosy Twice in my life now I have written short handbooks called 'Anti Money Laundering Guide'. I say that only to give an example of a title that – useful though I hope it is – isn't going to say 'Read on'.

But this first line does: My song is love unknown.

It takes a stroke of genius to come up with a line like that. It also takes a considerable talent to follow it up. But Samuel Crossman (1625-84) managed to keep the inspiration going for seven verses. This is one hymn where it's a great shame to omit verses (*For all the saints* is another).

Originally a Dissenter, Samuel Crossman joined the Church of England and served his early ministry in his native Suffolk. He moved to a parish in Bristol, and then became Dean of Bristol Cathedral only a year before his death. *My song is love unknown* was one of a small collection of nine sacred poems which Crossman called 'A Young *Man's Meditation'*. It's the only one of the collection to become famous, and then only because a facsimile edition of it was published by Daniel Sedgwick in 1863.

So a stroke of luck as well as of genius. Passiontide, perhaps more than Easter, has brought out the best in several hymn-writers, and this is now one of the best-loved of our Passiontide hymns. Its vivid depiction of the change of mood of the crowd (Sometimes they strew his and his sweet praises WAV, sing....Then 'Crucify' is all their breath) is followed, unusually in a hymn, by irony (Why, what hath my Lord done.....Sweet injuries). And finally Crossman manages to involve

us all (*This is my Friend, in whose sweet praise I all my days could gladly spend*).

Once again this is a hymn which deserved, and in 1919 got, a wonderfully lyrical tune which makes the words fly. John Ireland (1879-1962) was a prolific and perhaps under-rated composer who wrote both religious and secular music, and this tune (*Love Unknown*) was written while he was organist at St. Luke's, Chelsea. (You might be surprised to know that this is one hymn that I play more slowly than most other organists.)

A non-churchgoer might think that this sublime combination of words and music was simply a beautiful song, and it can bear comparison with the best of secular songs. But as Christians we have the great advantage, and privilege, of being able to believe in it as well.

Letter from the Right Reverend Ruth Worsley, Bishop of Taunton For Parish Newsletters – April 2020

Time to show our care for all

As we reflect on the Easter story this month I'm reminded of the sense of 'touch'. It was Passover, a religious festival, and as Jesus was laid in the tomb, Sabbath was upon them. So the usual burial rites were not attended to by the women who were closest to Jesus. It would have been improper to touch the dead body. Hence their early arrival on that resurrection morning.

In the following days, in attempts to dispel disbelief, Jesus' followers had opportunity to not only talk with him, eat with him, but also touch him as he came among them. Thomas's doubt was dispelled as he was invited to place his hand in the wounds of Christ.'

As I write this we are wondering what Covid 19 might have in store for us in the UK. We hear now that Italy has taken drastic action in hoping to contain the virus. I don't know what further precautions we in the UK may have taken by the time you read this.

Currently we are all taking greater care with our personal hygiene in washing hands and ensuring we use and bin tissues. Today, along with the rest of the Church of England, we in Bath and Wells, have recommended that we only receive bread or wafers at Holy Communion and refrain from touching, through blessing, sharing the Peace or prayer through laying on of hands.

There will be various responses to the concerns raised by the Government and the media. Some may feel anxiety or fear about the nature of the virus whilst others may wonder if the emergency planning appears over-reactive. Our response as a Church must be that we do what we can to ensure we stay safe by taking all precautions recommended. And that we do all we can to reassure people who may feel vulnerable and worried by staying calm and showing compassion and care for all.

But how do we express such care? I've realised that touch plays quite an important part in showing we care for someone. When I was training as a nurse for a brief period many years ago, I recall being shown some research on touch. It was an eye-opener! Even the briefest of touches can cause people to feel better, cared for and happier.

But the presence of Coronavirus means that we are having to withdraw touch to prevent the possibility of infection. So how might we try to replace touch with other signals of our care and value? What might that look like?

As folk may find themselves 'self-isolating' due to potential symptoms of the virus we have the opportunity to find new ways to show our care. Phone calls and cards, food deliveries, creative use of social media and streaming of worship services may all be ways to stay in touch and help people to know they are not alone. Rather than finding ourselves paralysed by the situation let us discover how we can create new opportunities to strengthen our relationships and communities.

May our actions be the reassuring, life-affirming 'touch' of the risen Christ this Easter!

ARE YOU ON ST ANDREW'S STOKE TRISTER WITH BAYFORD OR ST STEPHEN'S CHARLTON MUSGROVE ELECTORAL ROLL?

What is the Electoral Roll?

The church's Electoral Roll is the register of its voting members; it is a list of those qualified to attend and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. Electoral rolls provide an indication of the real membership and strength of the church.

Are you New to Area?

If so, you might want to join. If you were on it last year, you don't need to reapply.

Who Can Be on the Electoral Roll?

Baptised adults (over 16 years) who live in the parish, or who have worshipped regularly at the church for at least six months (or would have attended had sickness not prevented them) who are committed to being part of the life of the local Church of England congregation.

Why Join?

Enrolment is a way of saying "I belong". It is an act of commitment to the local church and the church as a whole. It opens the way for a greater involvement in the life of the church at parish, deanery, diocesan and national levels.

Golden Rule One

Each one of us think about how we can protect and support our neighbours. So much of the public rhetoric is sowing fear about the danger of other people. So, taking all the official precautions, offer help and reassurance to others – and don't demonise anyone or any group.

Golden Rule Two

Think about who may be suffering more than me. For those of us who are healthy, there is much less to worry about but the elderly, the housebound, those with chronic health conditions may be very anxious. How about phoning them regularly to be a friendly voice offering solace to their worries?

Also, people on zero hour contracts like cleaners, bar and restaurants staff might find their income affected. Can we find a way to ensure these people and their families are provided for?

Golden Rule Three

Don't give into panic and start hoarding food. There is plenty to go around so practise the Christian discipline of sharing. Ask your neighbours what they need and do you best to help them get it.

Golden Rule Four

Live today to the full. None of us ever knows what the future holds. In the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6.25–34), Jesus challenged his followers to live each day fully and not be afraid. Every time we are tempted to give in to fear, we need to make a conscious choice to respond in trust and openness. And, along with just over half the adults in the UK, don't forget to pray. Here's a suggestion:

Dear God our Shield and our Defender, guide and protect my neighbour in this time of health emergency; deliver them from all harm and may your love and care ever grow in this place. Through Jesus Christ, Our Lord, Amen.

Advice from Dr Emma Hannay (Public Health Specialist), Wayside Thatch, Stoke Trister

As you will know by now, Coronavirus, or COVID-19, is a new respiratory infection which is rapidly increasing in the UK. This outbreak is expected to get much worse in the coming weeks. While many people who have the disease have only mild symptoms, for some the disease can be very severe or even fatal. This is particularly true for older people or those who have a chronic illness such as emphysema, diabetes, hypertension or similar.



While our hospitals and health authorities are taking a number of actions, there are things we can do locally to reduce the impact of the outbreak on our community.

COVID-19 is mostly spread by droplets, and so most transmission happens between people who are close together (such as living in the same house). It can also be caught from touching surfaces, however this is much rarer.

All of us should stay at home (self-isolate) if we have a cough or fever, even if mild. We should also all wash our hands regularly (with soap, or with alcohol hand gel - both work well) and avoid touching our face, if possible. We should also stop attending large gatherings of people, such as concerts.

For people who are older (over 70) or who have a chronic disease, further steps will help reduce the risk of you becoming unwell. It may well be advisable to stay home, away from gatherings of people for the next few weeks while the outbreak is at its peak to reduce your chance of catching the disease. This may include not going to the supermarket, the shops, or other gatherings. This is particularly important for the next 2-4 weeks as our health system will struggle to cope with large numbers of sick people.

As a community, we want to support older people to enable you to do this. You might well have neighbours who will get your shopping, newspapers, library books, medical supplies etc. but if not, or if they get ill, do please get in touch with Rosy (our local vicar). We can then arrange for other community members less at risk to do grocery shopping or other errands so you don't need to leave the house as often as you might normally. We can also arrange for people to visit so you have regular contact with the outside world.

If you are able to volunteer to help with grocery runs or visits for those at greater risk, please let Rosy know and we will put you on the roster.

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Go the extra mile and help others

If you're above the age of 18, have a clean full driver licence and own a four-door car, why not volunteer for Somerset County Council to help others get to vital medical appointments? By committing as little as one day per week, you could greatly help a person who otherwise wouldn't be able to make appointments. Alternatively commit to more if that is what you choose!

Volunteer drivers provide a crucial transport service for non-emergency NHS patients and social care users enabling them to get to various locations across the county and further afield. You could also help transport children to college or to school, providing a crucial service to a young person's academic career. Each journey connects people with services they would otherwise miss out on. As a volunteer driver, you would be providing a vital lifeline to people in your community.

This is a rewarding opportunity to provide a valuable, practical support for people within your community and your mileage expenses will be reimbursed at up to 50p per mile. You will also be supported by a Transporting Officer from Somerset County Council's Transporting Somerset team.

Not only will you be helping the community, it's an excellent way of meeting new people.
