#### **Caring for God's Creation**

The difficulties of the past year have underlined in so many ways the critical importance of our natural environment to so many aspects of life. Certainly, living in such a



beautiful part of the world made lockdown so much more bearable.

World Environment Day on June 5th is one of many opportunities environmentalists take to focus attention on the dangers we face from pollution, climate change, species extinction and other environmental problems. For Christians, the issue goes even deeper: We know that God created

the world, and it belongs to Him, not us. While God has given us dominion over the earth, this is not to exploit or neglect it but to exercise care and responsibility, particularly in the interest of those who are poor and marginalised. After all, "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it" (Psalm 24:1).

It's great that the G7 summit is happening this month in Cornwall with its commitment to halting and reversing the loss of biodiversity by 2030. Let's pray that the G7 shows great leadership in tackling climate change and making sure those who are worst affected are better protected.

So what can we do locally? We will be thinking about this at the next Cafe Church on June 6th, at Forest Church on June 20th and Climate Change Sunday around harvest time. It's also worth us considering whether our churchyards could have small areas unmown and planted with native wildflowers. Churchyards are havens for some of our least recorded species - lichen and mosses. A huge variety can grow on gravestones and the sheltered conditions are perfect places for vertical lichen gardens. Seeing gravestones covered in small plants is good - they don't damage the stones and provide a haven for many microscopic insects. The modest costs of leaving wild areas are greatly outweighed by the substantial benefits to our declining flora and fauna.

We can also get into the habit of thanking God for our amazing world because gratitude acknowledges value and ask him to release wisdom to scientists, inventors, governments and ordinary people about how best to steward the planet. After all, he made it so knows how best to care for it!

So roll on some sunshine so we can all play our part in loving creation, enjoying all its blessings and leaving a great legacy for future generations!

### Letter from Ruth Worsley, Bishop of Taunton

A time to learn

'I am always ready to learn although I do not always like being taught,' wrote Winston Churchill. I think many of us would echo that thought!

A huge 'thank you' to our teachers and all who support been a tremendous effort across our diocese to ensure our

our schools! There has been a tremendous effort across our diocese to ensure our children have been able to continue their education during lockdowns and the need to restrict normal practice. Not only have the children been learning but teaching staff have also been going 'back to school' in order to find new means of communication. Governors, church communities and individual volunteers have gone the extra mile too, to encourage our teachers through gifts and cards and prayer. The whole school team deserves our gratitude.

Learning online is a challenge. Those of us who are spending many hours in Zoom rooms online these days can vouch for that. It's tiring! And it is not just our children who have found it so. At the end of this month we shall be celebrating the ordinations of our new priests. Last year they were ordained as deacons in September following three months as lay curates as a result of the pandemic restrictions.

What a year to be a deacon! They've had a very different learning experience than would normally be expected. Not so much opportunity of the 'hands-on' experience yet perhaps an even more profound learning possibility. I'm looking forward to hearing their stories!

### The Udder Point Of View

### From Church Farm Dairy

Hello its WA 18 EHF here again this month. What a difference a month makes, last month I said we needed some H2O to wash in the fertilizer and make the grass grow, well we have certainly had it and the grass has grown. There is an old saying Make Hay while the Sun shines, today's saying is make silage when you get a few dry days following each other.

This is the time of year that we harvest the grass and make it into silage for the girls to eat in the winter months. It's a great time for us tractors because we get a really good work out after the quiet winter months.

There are three different approaches to silage making on the farms in this area, there are the farms that have contractors in to do the whole job, these are usually the ones with the biggest shiniest tractors and equipment, then there are farms that pool their resources and work together, these normally have less shiny tractors and equipment and then there are other farms that do all the work themselves with their own tractors and equipment, some of which will be new and some older.

We are one of the farms that pool our resources with other farms in the area, its great fun as we all meet up after the dull winter period, there's Class the big green forage harvester that gobbles up the rows of grass in front of him, then there's John Deere, Valtra and sometimes Massey Ferguson or even another New Holland. We cut the grass with wide mowers, to be raked up into large rows for Class to gobble and spit out into the trailers that we are pulling alongside in the field. We then flex our muscles and pull the full trailers to the farm where the silage clamp is, we then disgorge the grass onto the floor of the clamp and then another friend with a big buck rake on the front of him, pushes the grass into a big heap between the walls of the clamp.

You may wonder how this turns into something that cows will eat in the winter, as when you put lawn mowings into a heap they just rot down into a slimy mess. The reason is because the walls of the clamp are lined with plastic sheet and the tractor that is pushing the grass in keeps rolling the grass to force the air out, when all the grass is in the clamp, a layer of cling film and then a layer of black plastic sheet is put on the top of the clamp which is weighted down to keep the air out. This with the help of an additive applied by Class, the gobbler, anaerobic fermentation takes place, this stabilises the grass and preserves it to feed in the winter.

I expect by the time you read this we will hopefully have been able to cut, hauled and clamped the grass for next winter. You might also have seen Class, Valtra, John Deere, New Holland and Massey Fergusson go past your doors.


