The Udder Point of View from Church Farm Dairy

Hi its 128 again, I thought you might like to know what has been happening to us girls since the last time one of us wrote. Well since lockdown finished for us in early March, (it will happen to you one day) we have been out grazing fresh grass, to start with it was a bit cold and then wet and the grass was suffering and not growing as well as we had hoped for, but now since the sun has begun to shine and the temperatures have risen we have reached M day. M day (Magic Day) is the day the grass grows quicker than we can eat it, we know this because Sam goes out with a plate metre and measures the amount of grass growth each week and then allocates which paddock has the required amount of grass for us. This is about 3-4 weeks later than usual.

Later in March we had our yearly TB test, this is when a vet comes and injects us with two jabs on day one and then on day four comes back and measures to see wether there has been a reaction to the jabs, if not we shouldn't have TB. Four of our girls were unlucky and they showed a reaction, this meant they were classified as Inconclusive Reactors and had to be retested 60 days later. So 6o days later when the vet came to do the test we all had everything crossed. It was all ok though as they all past the test and are still with us, if not they would have been slaughtered and we would all have had to have another two tests till we were all definitely clear, it was a worrying time for all.

I was ill as well, they noticed I was a bit of colour, so they called the vet out, (Private Medicine here) and he came out and saw me, I thought he was a nice chap until he told them that I had a displaced abomasum, my fourth and final stomach. He then said he could operate, which he did there and then, (Good this private medicine) with the help of Sam, after he injected me with anesthetic he cut me open and put my abomasum back in the right place, he then stitched me up and gave me a good dose of antibiotics, which lasted for a few days. I was then kept away from the rest of the girls for a few days, my milk had to be thrown away for several days, but I soon recovered and am now back out with the rest of the girls again, nasty scar, the needlework doesn't look that good.

Join us on the Pathway to Net Zero

In the run up to COP26, the UN Environment Conference that takes place in Glasgow in November 2021, churches are being encouraged to consider how they can take steps to care for our planet.

David Maggs, the Environment Champion for the Church of England in Somerset says, "In 2020 our new environmental strategy was approved. The <u>Covid</u> pandemic forestalled a major launch of the strategy, but as things start to return to normal we hope we can start to help people consider how they and their church can help care for creation. While we recognise many churches are still not open and not everyone is able to meet in person, there are still many ways to get involved.

"Already this year over 300 people from across Somerset have taken part in Wilder Churches training, a joint initiative with the Somerset Wildlife Trust as well as Churches Count on Nature Week and we really hope we can continue to build momentum and ensure that church communities across Somerset are doing all they can to care for this wonderful planet God has provided us with."

From the first of July you can simply committing to pray on the first of each month. Or register with Eco Church to see how sustainable your church is and to commit to making improvements. The Church of England has a Practical Pathway to Net Zero tool, a good starting point for churches trying to move towards 'net zero', a position where there is a balance between the carbon emitted into the atmosphere, and the carbon removed from it.
