D Check for danger.

R Response - try to get a response from the casualty.

A Airway - tilt back the head to open up the airway.

B Breathing - lean over their mouth to hear if they are breathing or not.

C CPR - if they are not responsive or breathing ring 999 and begin CPR.

Get someone to collect the defib machine but continue CPR until the defibrillator arrives and then just follow its instructions until the ambulance arrive.

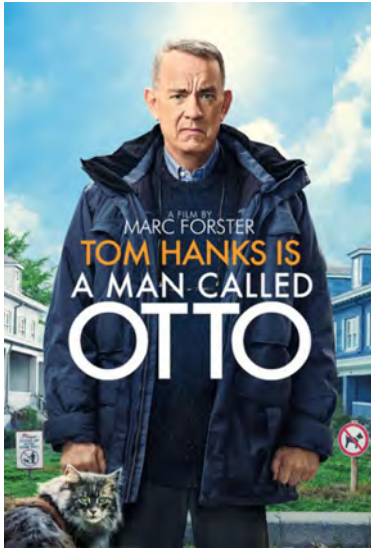

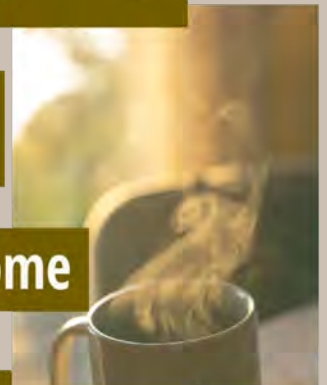

UDDER FARM HISTORY

Last month I told you about the new buildings we had 50 years ago and how the milking has changed over the years.

I also said that the cows ate hay and silage, so what is the difference ? The hay is made out of more mature grass and is dried out as much as possible, which with weather like we are having at the moment is very easy. The problem is that it was all made in small bales that had to be man handled. This improved slightly when a grab on the loader tractor could lift the bales on to the trailer and an elevator was used to put them in the barn, but they had to be man handled to be stacked in the barn.

The silage making machinery was also very different then compared with today. Then the grass was cut directly by a forage harvester which was pulled by a tractor, with a silage trailer attached to the back of the forage harvester. When the trailer was full, it was dropped off of the harvester and another one was hitched on. The full trailer was then hitched onto another tractor and taken back to the silage clamp and tipped out, before returning to the field for the process to begin again. The heap of grass was then pushed into the clamp with a buck rake on the back of a tractor and then spread by hand to get it level, all the time rolling it to keep the air out. The tractors were mainly without cabs and up to 85 horse power, the trailers were rated at 3 tons.

This grass because it was direct cut was quite long, when put in the clamp so was difficult to consolidate well, which is needed to expel the air to aid the fermentation of the grass to make it into a feed that the cows would eat, compared to a heap of grass that left on its own would turn into a heap of compost.

The direct cut forage harvester was developed over the years and a precision chop forage harvester was developed to cut the grass a lot shorter, so was a lot easier to spread in the clamp. Which saved the need of people to spread it by hand. This type of harvester needed the grass to be cut prior to being picked up, it started with about a 5 foot swathe being gobbled by the harvester, which was still being pulled by a tractor, which was loading into trailers pulled along side by other tractors. The tractors now mainly had quiet cabs, with radios, luxury! The power of the tractors was creeping up to 100-150 horse power for the one pulling the forage harvester and the trailers were rated up to 8 tons.

Today the size of the forage harvester has become self-propelled and the power has increased up to 900 horsepower, the tractors are up to 250 horsepower, the tractors have changed as well, with air conditioning, satellite guidance systems and automatic gearboxes, and the trailers are rated up to 18 tons and some even bigger. This means all of the rest of the machinery has also grown. This means that the grass can be harvested a lot quicker, up to 200 acres plus in a day, and the clamps sealed in a day or two compared with fifty years ago when it would have been lucky to have cleared 10 acres in a day.

The price of some of the machinery today would have bought a whole farm, fifty years ago!!!!

Want to support children in Somerset? Then Route1 is looking for you!

Route1 Advocacy and Independent Visitors is a service that supports children and young people who are in care or have a social worker. They do this by matching volunteers with young people as either short term Advocates, or longer term Independent Visitors.

Gardening season is here, time to sign up to a garden recycling collection.

Somerset residents are being reminded that they can sign up for a fortnightly home garden waste recycling collection.

The service run by Somerset Council has more than 56,000 subscribers and with spring well and truly here and gardens bursting into life, now is the perfect time to sign up.

Subscriptions can be started any time during the year and the quickest and easiest way to subscribe is online through the [somerset.gov.uk/waste](https://www.somerset.gov.uk/waste) page – just use the ‘Do it online/My Waste Service’ feature.

Collections are made fortnightly year-round (apart from a short break during Christmas and New Year). Residents can either sign up to a pre-paid 180-litre wheeled bin or 90-litre compostable paper sacks. The price of a wheeled bin subscription for 2023/24 is £63.50 for 25 collections and for packs of ten garden waste sacks, £31.10.

All garden waste stays in Somerset, going to one of several composting sites, including Dimmer and Walpole, where it is shredded, and turned into compost. The end-product is sold as revive soil conditioner through all recycling sites.

Residents who already subscribe to the service will be sent a reminder, by email or post, in the month prior to their subscription ending. For example, a May mailing for those expiring in June. However, there is no need to wait until you receive a reminder, subscriptions can be renewed at any time (you’ll still get a full year service). If you are not online, you can also subscribe by calling 0300 123 2224.

Home composting is the recommended option for garden waste and those who have space to do so can order a subsidised home composting bin from the council’s partner Get Composting. Garden waste can also be taken to any one of Somerset’s 16 waste recycling sites.

Garden waste should not be put out for collection with refuse. It is also not advised to burn garden waste, as this can cause pollution and local nuisance.

For other postcodes in Stoke Trister and Cucklington the recycling and garden waste is the same but refuse is only on the 21st.
