#### SOLIDARITY OR JUDGEMENT?

As a Vicar, I often encounter misconceptions about Christianity both inside and outside the church. A common one is that you have to be "good" to become a Christian and that God rejects you if you're not and don't follow his rules.

This is the opposite of the heart of Christianity which is not God's judgement but his solidarity with all people, symbolised by the cross. Everyone is accepted, everyone belongs. God has loving room for all of us—shockingly, even those we consider our enemies!

Jesus lived this way and calls us to imitate him. A Jewish believer, he forgave and loved everyone else, calling forth the divine in Gentiles and Roman centurions; in Jewish tax collectors who collaborated with the Empire; in zealots who opposed it; in sinners of all stripes; in eunuchs, pagan astrologers and all those "outside the law." Jesus had no trouble whatsoever with otherness and excluded no one.



An absolute realist, Jesus was and still is patient with the ordinary, the broken, the weak, and those who failed. He calls us to be peace and do justice but not to expect perfection in ourselves or the world. This only leads to intolerance and judgmentalism and makes ordinary love impossible.

Following him is not a "salvation scheme" or a means of creating some ideal social order as much as a calling to love the way that God loves—which we cannot and don't have to do by ourselves. He has given his life giving Spirit to enable us to live beyond our human capacities and to see him in all people and things, even the painful, tragic and sinful places where we do not want to look for God. He is in us and with us, "reconciling all things in himself" (Ephesians 2:14–16).

So don't believe that you or those you dislike aren't good enough for God. Your worth and value to him was demonstrated 2000 years ago - and that can never be changed!

As you read this you may well be putting your feet up and having a well-earned rest from school, work or even church! Summer is a time for taking things a little easier and making space for rest and relaxation. But of course, many continue to work hard to make such recreation possible for us! We may want to take a moment to value all those who make our holidays possible. There's always room to say, 'thank you!'

You will be aware that I recently had the opportunity of taking a little time out for some sabbatical. Howard and I spent a month walking the Via Di Francesco, a pilgrimage walk, in the footsteps of St Francis, in Italy. We walked some 140 miles from Rome to Assisi, using local transport for the other 40 or 50 miles along the way. We took our time, not least because of the wear and tear on our hips and knees as we went up and down steep gradients. In addition, it gave us room to notice things along the way.

It is often the small, seemingly insignificant things which can get overlooked as we travel through life isn't it. How many of us make the time to 'stand and stare' as William Davies puts it in his poem, 'Leisure'? So, I found myself discovering new meaning in the unexpected moments of pause that the walk brought us. The brief conversation with Destiny, a refugee, whilst we waited at a bus stop, who generously shared his bus tickets with us. The awareness of the world of creation around us – birdsong; the quill of a porcupine on the path; a family of wild pigs running through wheat fields. The kindness and hospitality of strangers. Encountering God in new people and places.

During this month, when perhaps the business of your life is stilled a little, are you expecting to encounter God? Will he need to break in or interrupt you, or how might you intentionally make time for him? Where might you notice the glimpses of God in the world around and hear his voice speaking into your experience?

I hope that this summer you will experience not only the rest and recreational power of a good holiday but also the space to renew your relationship with God. Along with the writer to the Ephesians, I pray 'that you may have the power to comprehend, ...what is the breadth and length and height and depth,' of God's love for you.

#### **Stoke Trister Defibrillator Project**

Following on from the number of times the Bayford defibrillator has been used since it was installed nearly 3 years ago the parish council would like to purchase one for Stoke Trister.

The first **ten minutes** are crucial in the advent of a cardiac arrest and early access to a defibrillator can be life saving. Time driving to a defibrillator is losing precious minutes and

also potentially dangerous in a high pressure situation. It is much more ideal if the defibrillators are placed where people can quickly grab them.

The purchase and installation costs of a defibrillator in an external cabinet sited centrally in Stoke Trister would be around £3,250, ongoing costs are minimal.

## **UDDER FARM**



Last month I was saying how the size of the machinery and tractors had increased in size over the past fifty years. Other things have also changed, some for the better some for the worse.

Fifty years ago most farm inputs were man handled, no loaders

or material handlers available, most of the concentrate (cake) that

we fed to the cows and other animals on the farm came in either 1cwt(50Kg) bags or 1/2cwt (25Kg) bags, very little came in bulk. This meant that it all had to be manhandled off of the lorries that delivered it into watertight buildings to store it. If you knew a delivery was coming and hoped the lorry driver unloaded it himself, this happened on rare occasions as the regular drivers knew that you would be there just after breakfast or lunch so would always seem to turn up then.

Sometimes we would have molassed sugar beet delivered, which was in 1cwt paper bags, these were normally delivered straight from the sugar beet factories, this was to reduce the handling. This was fine as it saved handling twice, but when the bags were loaded onto the lorries they had just come off the production line and the pressed sugar beet pulp was still warm. The only problem with this was that by the time the lorry had arrived from the eastern counties, the beet had cooled down and you had a 1cwt block, similar to a block of concrete. This was then dropped onto your shoulder by the lorry driver to be put in the store, this was no problem you would think when you started, but 10 tons of these bags was hard work, as I don't know if you have worked it out but this is 200 heavy bags, the worst bit was when you had them all stacked nicely in the shed, was that over the winter months when you were going to feed the product, everyone off them had to be taken out again! Thank goodness that loaders and material handlers were developed to handle these heavy lifting jobs. But as my father used to say in those days men were men and women were glad of it.

Udder things that have changed in size are the bulk tank that the milk is cooled and stored in. The first one we had held 340 gallons(1500ltrs), now it is 2000 gallons(9000ltrs) and the milk is kept refrigerated at 4oC and is picked up every other day, where as it was picked up daily. Consequently the lorries have also grown in size, which reduces haulage costs and also lorry movements in the village. Before the milk was collected in bulk tanks the milk was collected in churns and the churn lorries would rattle their way around the village picking up the milk from all the farms, hence the milk stand at Church Farm, where the churns were put for the lorry to pick up.
