Glimpsing the glory of God

Recently Jane and I made our first trip to Iona which is accessed by small boat from the adjacent island of Mull. According to tradition Columba and twelve companions went there in 563AD. The monastery they founded became a centre of mission and teaching and played a crucial role in the conversion to Christianity of Scotland and the Anglo-Saxon Kingdom of Northumberland.

However, during the Viking invasions the monastery was destroyed and abandoned, until 1938 when the Revd George MacLeod re-founded a community there and rebuilt the Abbey. MacLeod was an unconventional and at times controversial figure. He became a pacifist, despite having serving in World War One. He saw action in Greece and then at Ypres and Passchendaele for which he was awarded the Military Cross and the French Croix de Guerre for bravery.

After ordination he turned his back on prosperous prestigious parishes to become minister at Govan, a parish in a poor part of Glasgow with considerable social problems. However, he is best remembered for founding the lona Community as an international ecumenical community which emphasised mission, political involvement, the ministry of healing and worship. Through this he sought to keep the Church connected with an increasingly secular industrial society.

It is whilst on Iona that he is attributed with popularizing the concept of "Thin Places," a concept which comes from Celtic Christianity. Celts believed that in some places God's presence seems more tangible, more accessible than elsewhere. Places where heaven and earth seem to touch, where the holy and the human meet. Places where the Spirit of God is at work in ways that we can sense, where both beauty and brokenness co-exist.

I believe that God can and does meet us everywhere, that he is present with us on every step of life's journey. Nonetheless, for those early Celtic Christians on Iona, looking at where sky and sea met, it must have seemed that they were on the edge of the world, where heaven and earth met. We were only on Iona for a day but as we left I felt I had glimpsed something of the glory of God and that something of the peace of God was coming back with me.

May the Lord be with us all wherever we are and whatever we do.

From the Organ Bench

The 82 years of John Newton's life (1725-1807) were more eventful than most hymnwriters experienced. His transformation from the ruthless sailor who worked for a slaveowner to fiery, highly effective evangelical preacher echoes that of St. Paul – except that St. Paul wasn't much of a sailor.

I could fill this whole column with his life's story: suffice it to say that having steered his ship through a violent storm, he underwent a Damascene conversion following his and the ship's deliverance. He married Mary, his childhood sweetheart, and in the process of time gave up his seafaring career and became an ordained priest. His first living was at Olney in Buckinghamshire, where he spent 15 years, and his second and last was in the City of London (27 years, until his death).

At Olney he wrote a hymn every week, and he and his friend and neighbour William Cowper compiled *Olney Hymns* in 1779. The best-known and best-loved of John Newton's hymns is undoubtedly *Glorious things of thee are spoken*. This takes its vision and inspiration from several passages from the Bible, including Revelation, but particularly Isaiah 33: 21 ('But there the glorious Lord will be unto us a place of broad rivers and streams'). He used the city of Zion (Jerusalem) to represent Christian aspiration in physical terms, and invited us all to join him in the community:

Solid joys and lasting treasure None but Zion's children know.

Once again here is a hymn guaranteed eternal popularity by music. Franz Joseph Haydn (1832-1809) wrote the great tune known as *Austria* as a national anthem in praise of the Austrian Emperor; it's now the tune for the German national anthem (another long story there...). *Glorious things* is still often sung to this tune, but in 1941 Cyril Taylor (1907-92, sometime vicar of Cerne Abbas and finally Precentor of Salisbury) wrote *Abbot's Leigh* for this hymn. It quickly became popular with congregations at that time understandably unwilling to sing the tune of the German national anthem. Nowadays both tunes are equally popular. *Abbot's Leigh* is a very fine, strong tune and deserves to be learnt, either to this hymn or to others in the same metre.

The first church where I was organist, in the early 1970s, was in a Hampshire village, Holybourne. The vicar and I decided that we'd introduce this tune, and it went very well. In the last line congregations invariably sing one note, the third from the end, which is easier than the one that Cyril Taylor wrote. I suggested that we should 'go with the flow'. The vicar, in a fine example of Christian orthodoxy, said 'That's all right: Cyril Taylor is still alive – so he won't know'.

He knows now – and I hope he doesn't mind. **David Duvall**

National 100 Days of Prayer for Peace August 4th - November 11th 2018

100 years ago:

On 4th August 1918, King George V led the nation in a National Day of Prayer for Peace. One hundred days later, on November 11th 1918, the 1914-18 war ended.

On 4 August 2018, thousands of people across the UK will start 100 days of Prayer for Peace until Remembrance Sunday on November 11th 2018, one hundred years after the First World War ended.

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me bring love. Where there is offence, let me bring pardon. Where there is discord, let me bring union. Where there is error, let me bring truth. Where there is doubt, let me bring faith. Where there is despair, let me bring hope. Where there is darkness, let me bring your light. Where there is sadness, let me bring joy.



O Master, let me not seek as much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love, for it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to Eternal Life. Amen

Lord, in a world disfigured by conflict, unrest and violence we pray that your peace would break through. Soften the hearts of those who perpetrate injustice. Set free all prisoners of war and bless and favour those whose struggle is for peace. Your Son Jesus Christ is the Prince of Peace; May His love and power within give us strength and energy in the battle for peace. Give us courage to be peacemakers and reconcilers. May the good news of forgiveness and peace be proclaimed across this benefice as we tread the path set before us. In Jesus' name we pray this. *Amen.*

Other short prayers you may like to use:

- Fill me and my family with your peace
- Expose injustice & release your blessing of peace on this nation
- Raise up peacemakers across the world so that love conquers division, hatred and war and the hurting and wounded are healed.

Heaven's Hose Pipe

Being a relatively new convert to gardening, I am sometimes unsure what to leave in the soil and what needs removing. But brambles, dandelions, nettles and creeping buttercup are definitely now on the eviction list as new borders materialise and my garden slowly takes shape. My favourite time is after watering, when the weeds come out by the root and new space emerges for planting and colour!

The extreme heat and the real need for water has put me in mind of the potent Biblical images of the sun scorched land and the well watered garden whose spring never fails. The prophet Isaiah equates the hard, baked earth of the sun-scorched land with the stony hearts of people going through the motions of religion but who have forgotten God's ways. Their lives are full of oppression of the poor, neglect of the hungry, malicious talk and selfishness.

But God promises water for the desert. Water is his goodness and when we are watered by him, we are fruitful, beautiful and a source of comfort and well being to others. Well watered hearts flowing with God's goodness can't help but overflow and 'loose the chains of injustice ... share our food with the hungry ... provide shelter for the homeless ... clothe the poor and care for those in need all around us' (Isaiah 58:6,7).

And although, in my experience, my well watered garden seems to produce as many weeds as plants, those weeds can be so easily removed! And so for hearts regularly soaked in God's love - behaviours that spoil or diminish our lives can be removed by the root making space for new life to grow. Heaven has no hose pipe bans so let's turn on the tap!
