Letter from the Bishop

'To be or not to be – that is the question.' Or perhaps we should say 'to stay or not to stay – that is the question'. June 23 is EU Referendum Day and some commentators say it is the most important election most of us will vote in. The difficulty seems to be, for me at least, to know what the real issues are and how these should be assessed and weighted. Financial, political, economic and social arguments have been presented by both sides and there is seemingly no consensus as to which arguments are the most persuasive or compelling.

In all that I have heard to date, however, there seems to have been too much emphasis upon self-interest ('what we might get out of it') and not enough being said about service and mutual flourishing ('what we can put into it'). Of course, it is important to consider what the impact on staying or leaving would be on the UK but there is another important question which we need to consider - what can we contribute as a nation to the development, security and prosperity of other countries in the world and would that be best served by staying or by leaving?

As we know, opinion polling is not an exact science but analysts seem to agree it might be close. Research suggests younger people are more likely to vote to remain in the EU, while older voters tend to favour leaving. My hope is that we will all make it a matter of focussed and sustained prayer. Let's pray that this will serve to unite rather than divide the UK and, whatever the outcome, that the UK will continue to seek the peace and welfare of all. Let's pray for God's peace and blessing on all the nations of the world.

Saints and Holy Ones: West Country Connections

5th June: St. Boniface (675-754) was a Devon man who was probably born in Crediton. He was to become known as 'the Apostle to Germany'. He went to school at a monastery near Exeter and then to the Abbey of Nursling in Winchester diocese.

Here he became director of studies and was an inspiring lecturer. He is known for writing the first Latin grammar known to have been completed in England. His lectures were so appreciated that copy notes were made and circulated to other monasteries. He was ordained priest at 30.

In 716 he refused preferment in England and went to work among the warlike tribes in Friesland and then obtained a general commission to do missionary work in Germany. There he challenged the tribal beliefs of the old Norse gods.

His work was so successful that he was created a regionary bishop, writing to the English monasteries for prayers and help in the mission to 'those who are of one blood and bone with you.' Their response included parties of monks and nuns going out to join him. The monasteries he established became celebrated as centres of faith and learning.

In 732, he became Archbishop, with the power to consecrate bishops in the territories beyond the Rhine. He regenerated the Frankish Church, where behaviour had grown very slack. He and brought the monasteries back under Benedictine rule. His many letters show he dealt with a variety of human problems with wisdom and great gentleness.

At 80, he resigned his great offices and went back to evangelise the Friesians. He died for his faith in an attack by tribesmen and is buried at Fulda. Boniface was a great missionary preacher, an outstanding administrator and a learned and holy man. Archbishop Cuthbert of Canterbury wrote: we in England count him as one of the best and greatest teachers of the true faith.'

8th June: Thomas Ken (1637-1711)

Thomas Ken's early life was first coloured by the early death of his mother and subsequently by his wide social contacts and royal connections. He became a prebendary of Winchester Cathedral and in 1697 was appointed chaplain to Princess Mary, daughter of Charles II, who was married to the morose William of Orange. Thomas incurred the wrath of William and had to leave for the Netherlands, returning to become royal chaplain to Charles II.

When Charles came to Winchester, Thomas refused to vacate his house for the King's mistress, Nell Gwyn. It seems Charles did not hold a grudge against him as a year or two later he agreed to the appointment as Bishop of Bath 'little Ken, who refused poor Nelly a lodging.' However, Charles died in 1685, to be succeeded by the Catholic minded James. When the Archbishop of Canterbury and seven bishops, including Thomas Ken, protested, they were against his changes to the law, James sent them to the Tower of London, charged with seditious libel and arraigned them in court, where they were promptly acquitted. King James fled to France and William of Orange was sent for.

Having sworn allegiance to James, whom they had challenged only over his unlawful actions; the clergy could not swear allegiance to William in his place, which they were required to do. The original protestors, plus 400 English clergy and nearly all the bishops and clergy in Scotland refused to take the oath and were all deprived of their offices. The effects of depriving the Church of England of its best clergy were felt for many years.

Thomas Ken retired to Longleat, the home of his friend Lord Weymouth. He lived for a further 22 years but never held office again. He composed two well-known hymns: 'Awake my soul, and with the sun' and 'Glory to thee my God this night.' He is buried at St. John's Church in Frome.

From the Organ Bench – June 2016

I bind unto myself today The strong name of the Trinity....

Sunday 22 May this year was Trinity Sunday (followed of course by over twenty Sundays after Trinity, the Church calendar having run out of imagination). The concept of God, Three in One, is a difficult one to explain, and I shan't try – but at least Trinity Sunday has inspired some glorious hymns, including the one known as 'St. Patrick's Breastplate', which starts with the invigorating, reassuring words quoted above.

Most of the information about St. Patrick's life is doubtful. He seems to have been born in England (of the four United Kingdom patron saints, only St. David can claim to have been born in the country he represents); he became a missionary in Ireland, then a bishop, around 600 AD. He became, it seems, a natural Irishman, using the three leaves of the shamrock to illustrate the Trinity, and also, when baptising the King of Ireland, accidentally banging his bishop's crozier down hard on the King's foot.

If he did have any words written on a breastplate (although it may have been a metaphorical 'breastplate of faith'), it was probably the verse now translated as:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me.

The whole poem was translated into English in the 1860s and versified by Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-95). Born in Dublin and married to a priest who became Bishop of Derry, Mrs. Alexander is most famous for this fine versification and for a great hymn celebrating St. Andrew (*Jesus calls us: o'er the tumult*); and three much-loved hymns for young people: All things bright and beautiful, There is a green hill and Once in royal David's city.

'St. Patrick's Breastplate' is set in almost all hymn-books to two quite separate traditional Irish tunes (the second tune is to *Christ be with me....*), arranged by Ireland's best-known church musician, Sir Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). Stanford was Professor of Composition at the Royal College of Music in London, then Professor of Music at Cambridge from 1887 until his death. He is nowadays perhaps most revered for his settings of the canticles for Morning and Evening Prayer: those of you who are or have been choristers will remember 'Stanford in B flat', although arguably his finest settings are of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in C.

Let the 'strong name of the Trinity' transcend the troubles of the last hundred years, and remind us of the unbroken link of Irish Christianity from the seventh century, so eloquently revived in words and music in the nineteenth.
