May 2016 parish magazines article

May is a special month. Not least because it is the month in which I was born. No special Birthday this year however and I'm not sure if I really want to keep counting! However it is also in this month that we mark the Birthday of the Church: the day of Pentecost, the day when the Spirit of God set his people alight with the wonder of what God had done for them. Those new believers couldn't help but tell their story.

During the week leading up to Pentecost (May 8–15) Archbishops Justin and Sentamu are calling on us all to pray in the words of the Lord, as he taught us to say, 'Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done'. They are encouraging us to pray for the evangelisation of the nation.

Within the diocese we are beginning to make our first strategic priority one of 'putting mission and evangelism at the heart of all we do'. This means that we want to make sure we stay true to that initial purpose of what the Church is all about, the same purpose as that small gathering of believers who wanted to share their story of faith with others.

'Mission statements' are common practice for most companies let alone churches these days. However the word 'evangelism' can make us feel somewhat uncomfortable. All the talk of radicalism and fundamentalism in the media can make us fearful of using the word. Perhaps some of us have even experienced an over-zealous believer seeking to browbeat us into thinking as they do. However it would be a shame to allow the baby to get thrown out with the bathwater.

Christ's last words to his disciples after his resurrection and before he left them to return to his Father, were "Go to all peoples everywhere and make them my disciples." Evangelism means 'good news', or in its active sense, 'bringing or announcing good news'. So what's so wrong with that?

The Old Testament tells a wonderful story of four lepers who, during the siege of Samaria by the Syrian army, decided that as they were already rejected by their families and starving they might as well throw themselves on the mercy of the enemy. On arriving in the camp they discover it abandoned and so stuff themselves with the abundant food remaining and claim the spoils of war. And then they think, "We shouldn't be doing this! We have good news and we shouldn't keep it to ourselves." (2 Kings 7:9 GNB)

If we have discovered the life-giving bread of Christ then shouldn't we too begin sharing it?

The Cost of Discipleship

9th **April**: Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-45), is commemorated by the Anglican Church on the date of his death, when he paid the 'ultimate price' of discipleship.

He was born in Breslau in 1906, the son of an eminent psychiatrist. Ordained into the Lutheran Church he believed that a transcendent God had revealed himself to the human race only through the life of Christ and the scriptures. When the Nazis took control in Germany in 1933, Dietrich opposed the persecution of the Jews, and was forced to leave Germany.

He had an international reputation as a Protestant theologian. He took a major lecture tour in the USA, becoming well-known in ecumenical circles as an interpreter of what was happening in Germany. He was asked to return home to lead a group of breakaway Lutheran theologians and students. He became one of the leaders of the 'Confessing Church' but was forbidden to preach in Germany by the Nazis. In 1937 he published 'The Cost of Discipleship.'

This book is still relevant today, sharing as it does the timelessness of other great Christian classics. It commentates on 'the most treasured part of Christ's teaching, the Sermon on the Mount, with its call to discipleship and on the grace of God and the sacrifice that it demands'.

He was lecturing in the USA just before WW2 broke out but caught one of the last ships back to a persecuted life and prepared for martyrdom. He was arrested and imprisoned in 1943 and wrote there 'Letter and Papers from Prison' – an eloquent testimony both to his faith and his suffering. He wrote a letter to a friend: "We must throw ourselves completely into the arms of God, taking seriously, not our own sufferings, but those of God in the World – watching with Christ in Gethsemane.'

Paster Bonhoeffer was hanged at Flossenberg concentration camp. His statue is among those of the 20thC martyrs on the west front of Westminster Abbey.

14th **May**: The church commemorates another theologian and spiritual great, our own Julian of Norwich. Her name is derived from the Church of St. Julian in Norwich, where she lived in her 'cell', as an anchoress (a woman dedicated to prayer). Here she was visited for help and advice by local people and others. We may not know her name or the exact dates of her birth in 1342 or death, but it was on 8th May, 1373 that Julian received a series of 16 'shewings' or visions of our Lord. It is significant that she meditated on these for twenty years before recording them and their meaning as *The Revelations of Divine Love*.

This was the first book known to be written by a woman in English and is acknowledged the world over as a great classic of spiritual literature. The book vanished for hundreds of years but once rediscovered, it has remained in print throughout the entire 20th century to the present day even through the two World Wars. Several of her sayings have passed into common usage.

Julian's visions occurred when she was seriously ill and prayed that she might see Christ's passion. In spite of the pain and suffering inflicted upon Christ, she saw that God was primarily all loving. Although the times she lived in were full of suffering due to plague, hunger and war, her message like St. Paul's, was: 'suffering yet always rejoicing'. "Because of our good Lord's tender love to all those who shall be saved, he quickly comforts them saying, 'The cause of all this pain is sin. But all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well.' These things were said so kindly and without a hint of blame to me or any who shall be saved. So how unjust it would be for me to blame God for allowing my sin when he does not blame me for falling into it." In these words, I saw the deep, high mystery of God, which he will show to us in his heaven.

From the Organ Bench

Let's start with a tune this month – a glorious, triumphant tune which is set to two Easter hymns and brings with it the joy of the risen Christ. It's called *Gelobt sei Gott* (God be praised) and it was composed by Melchior Vulpius (1570-1615), a German church musician whose original surname was Fuchs (Fox) which he Latinised to Vulpius. His final post was Stadtkantor (equivalent to Precentor) at Weimar.

By the time that you read this, I hope that we'll have filled the church on Easter Sunday with singing, to this great tune:

The strife is o'er, the battle done: Now is the Victor's triumph won: O let the song of praise be sung: Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

This is a translation of an anonymous Latin hymn (*Finita iam sunt proelia*) translated by Francis Pott (1832-1909), clearly in a happier mood than when he wrote *Forty days and forty nights*. It's a great hymn which finishes by reminding us of the whole context of the Resurrection:

Lord, by the stripes which wounded thee, From death's dread sting thy servants free; That we may live, and sing to thee: Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

During Eastertide we also sing *Gelobt sei Gott* to an equally triumphant celebration of the Resurrection – *Good Christian men, rejoice and sing* ('men' of course meaning the whole of mankind, not just the male half of the population!). This is the work of Cyril Alington (1872-1955) whose last two posts were as Head Master of Eton College and Dean of Durham Cathedral, and who by all accounts was greatly admired in both.

This tune gets a third airing whenever we celebrate Jesus's final triumph as King. *Christ is the King! O friends rejoice* seems to have been the only hymn – but what a great one – written by George Bell (1883-1958) who was successively Dean of Canterbury Cathedral and Bishop of Chichester. He is best-known for having commissioned T.S. Eliot's play *Murder in the Cathedral* (1935) and for his friendship and collaboration with the heroic German pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

As we rejoice and sing, let us be thankful for all these writers, but especially to Melchior Vulpius whose tune brings their words to life.
