We have all been shocked and upset by the recent pictures from Calais, Hungary and – most distressingly – the beach in Turkey where the body of little Aylan Kurdi was washed ashore.

It feels as if there has been a breakdown in the human race's ability to care for its weakest members. While the big picture of politics and civil war perplexes us, the individual tragedies go straight our hearts. We all want to do something.

The plans announced by the Prime Minister relate only to bringing to Britain refugees from the camps established in the countries surrounding Syria. With the vast numbers of refugees looking for support in Europe, I echo Archbishop Justin's comment that this is a slim response. There is human need on our doorstep as well. The United Kingdom could and should do more as a nation to help our European partners as they struggle to deal with all this. You may want to write to your MP about this.

Our churches have already been asking what they can do to help, and collections of money and goods have already been taking place on a more or less *ad hoc* basis. We see practical needs, and it is natural to want to help. However, rather than start up lots of small-scale collections, I would encourage churches to work through established agencies who are already working in the field. These agencies have the skills and experience to do this work – whether that be at Calais or in Jordan, the Lebanon, or Syria itself. As regards the people at Calais, the UK and France are well-resourced countries. The agencies on site can buy what they need if they have the money: collecting and delivering supplies may not be the most helpful thing unless it is known there are resources to deliver and distribute them fairly.

Some people have already expressed their desire to open their home to a refugee family. offering rooms or meals. This is a generous and hospitable gesture. The time is not yet right for this to happen – we will have to wait for the Government's relocation scheme to be worked out. When refugees arrive, churches will be in the forefront of those offering assistance, and we will need to do this well. It will not be an easy task. There will be issues of language, dealing with vulnerable and traumatised people, finding suitable schools, and so on. Again, we will do best to work with agencies who know what they are doing.

SAINTS AND HOLY ONES

Over the last two thousand years the Church has produced people from many walks of life and Christian traditions, who down the ages have been part of 'the great cloud of witnesses' who have enriched our understanding of the Christian faith. Their festivals, lesser festivals and commemorations are commemorated in the calendar of the Church of England. Each month in the magazine it is hoped to include some biography and perhaps prayers or sayings of these Christians and hope their examples might excite us to holiness. 4th October: St. Francis, Il poverello, the little poor man of Assisi, was born to wealth but gave it all up to follow Christ, after hearing a voice speaking to him from the Crucifix in the little church of San Damiano, saying 'Repair my church'. He came to realise it was not church buildings but the Church itself he was being called to rescue. He took a vow of poverty and begged arms for the poor. He began to preach Christ's message and was joined by other men, they called themselves the lesser brothers – friars minor. Francis drew up a Rule of poverty, celibacy obedience, which the Pope approved. With Clare of Assisi he founded an Order for women. His prayer 'Make me an instrument of your peace' is not born of mere words, for during the crusades he travelled to Egypt, where in what is claimed as the first instance of interfaith dialogue, he met with the Sultan in Egypt. Francis is associated with stories of preaching to the birds and taming the wolf of Gubbio. In the 20th century during works in the church there, the skeleton of a wolf was discovered buried in front of the altar. Francis patterned his life on Christ's, showed deep love and concern for the poor and created the first 'nativity play' at Greccio'...Whilst in severe pain and unable to see after an eye operation near the end of his life, Francis wrote the beautiful Canticle of Brother Sun. It is a song of praise to the 'Most high, all-powerful, all good Lord!' In turn he gives thanks for the sun, moon, stars, wind, air, Sister Water, Brother Fire and ultimately Sister Death 'from whose embrace no mortal can escape'. 'Praise and bless my Lord and give him thanks and serve him with great humility.' He died on the evening of 3rd October 1226, by which time his Order had spread throughout Western Christendom.

Amongst some of the Holy ones remembered in October:

10th October **Thomas Traherne** the English poet died on this day in 1674.

15th October **St. Teresa of Avila** who became an indefatigable founder of religious houses, and reformed the Carmelite Rule helped by St. John of the Cross. Her spiritual writings include the 'The Way of Perfection' and 'The Interior Castle.' Her prayers and sayings are remembered and well loved. 'St. Teresa's Bookmark', "Let "nothing disturb thee, Nothing affright thee, All things are passing....."

26th October **Alfred the Great K**ing of the West Saxons. who chased the Danes from Penselwood and ended their threat to the British Isles. He founded and supported religious houses that were centres for education and care of the sick and poor. He translated into the vernacular and evolved a legal code based on common sense and Christian mercy. His life was marked by the compassion of Christ. He died on this day 899.



From the Organ Bench

This month we'll do two hymns in one – but because a harvest festival service isn't the same without them, they're both worth a mention.

I can't imagine a harvest festival service starting with anything other than *Come, ye thankful people, come*'. This was written by Henry Alford (1810-71) who was an energetic Dean of Canterbury Cathedral. Alford was a considerable classical scholar and theologian who wrote a much-praised commentary on the New Testament; he died of overwork, uniquely among 19th-century deans. This triumphant hymn was much altered by the perfectionist Alford and also (against his wishes and for no obvious reason) by the compilers of the original Hymns Ancient and Modern. The glorious tune 'St. George' was composed by Sir George Elvey (1816-93), who was organist of St. George's, Windsor.

Another vigorous tune accompanies *We plough the fields and scatter / The good seed on the land*. Johann Schulz (1747-1800) managed to move away from his countrymen's rather ponderous chorale tunes and wrote the tune 'Wir pflügen' for the original German words *Wir pflügen und wir streuen* by Matthias Claudius (1740-1815). This quickly became popular in Germany, and was mentioned in a short story by the 19th-century English novelist Elizabeth Gaskell – although the festival watched by the English traveller in the story was giving thanks for the harvest of grapes. (Not so much ploughing and scattering as the subsequent refreshment of the ploughmen.)

Wir pflügen was translated rather cleverly in the same unusual metre by Jane Montgomery-Campbell (1817-78) and appeared in a collection of songs published by a Devon vicar. It's fun to go up a key (All together now....) for the final refrain (*All good gifts around us....*), and I hope that the cheerful, thankful people who gave us the words and tune would approve.

Let's raise the roof with both of these at our Harvest Festivals: by the time you read this we will have already done so at St. Andrew's.


