One does what one can

A traveller found a small bird lying on its back with its feet in the air. "Bird," the traveller said, "Why are you lying upside down like that?" "I heard the heavens are going to fall today," the bird replied. "I suppose", the traveller laughed, "you think your spindly little legs are going to hold it up." And the little bird said quietly, "Well sir, one does what one can."

I found this little story in the midst of the Olympic and Paralympic Games. Watching athletes facing both triumph and disaster, I was encouraged to see that each time a British athlete of whatever discipline was interviewed, whether a medal winner or not, they responded with the phrase, "We are here to inspire a generation." Their response was like that of the little bird, "One does what one can."

The Brazilian priest, Dom Helder Camara who was committed to the Christian vision of a just world and of a humanity made in God's image reflected: "We who are charged with announcing the message of Christ need to learn the incomparable lesson that he taught by his own example. He taught first of all with his life and only then did he preach." Each of us can teach with our lives. One does what one can.

The Bishop of Rouen, St. Victrius who lived from 330- 407, spoke of his own calling. "I inspired the wise with the love of peace. I taught the unteachable. I explained it to the ignorant. I imposed it on the obstinate insisting on it in season and out of season." One does what one can.

We are called like the Olympic athletes to "inspire a generation". Too often in the church we "migrate inwards" as Dietrich Bonhoeffer once observed of the church. The Olympic dream is to inspire outwards, and it is at the heart of our calling.

Our lives, our words, must be the message of Christ, who did not migrate inwards but came among us to save us from ourselves, our obsessions, our injustices and our wrongs. Like St. Victrius, "He did all he could, even if he did not do all that wanted doing."

Our traditional auction of produce will be held on Monday, 1st October at 7 pm at Bayford Chapel followed by supper.

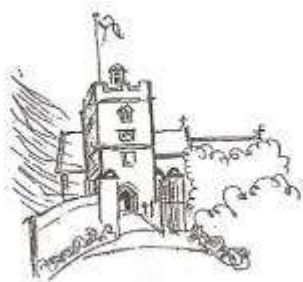
Churchyard at St Andrew's Church, Stoke Trister

As fewer than thirty burial spaces remain in the Churchyard extension, the PCC has resolved to change its policy on applications for grave reservations. In future it will recommend to the Chancellor of the Diocese that unless exceptional circumstances apply, only applications from parishioners of Stoke Trister with Bayford should be approved. A copy of the notice placed on the church notice board can be obtained from Nigel Noble (Churchwarden) on 01963 31071 or nigel.noble@btinternet.com. It is stressed that the change of policy refers only to burial spaces. There is plenty of room in the ashes plot.

Cucklington Community Access Defibrillator

The defibrillator is now installed in the old telephone kiosk in Babwell Road (Post Code BA9 9PU). Please do not park in front of the kiosk at any time to ensure clear access.

In emergencies the defibrillator can be accessed using a key code number which will be obtained from the emergency services when phoning 999. Ambulance response will be triggered immediately 999 calls are made but use of a defibrillator at the earliest possible moment is a proven life saver.

The defibrillator provides clear voice instructions for its use. It is intended to run further annual refresher training courses in the village on the lines of the two successful courses that have already taken place.

DEFIBRILLATORS

In the May edition of this newsletter, the Parish Council asked for the views of the Parish regarding the installation of defibrillators in Stoke Trister and Bayford.

These can be lifesavers. They are expensive and need manning. Some of our neighbouring parishes have them already. The reply to the above request for views was 100% zero. No-one expressed a point of view. Your Parish Council is unwilling to embark on an item of major expenditure without the approval of a good proportion of the inhabitants.
