Cracking open an Easter egg to reveal the treasure within is always a pleasure to my senses, if not my waistline! And just as the grey chrysalis cracks open to reveal a sparkling butterfly within, so Easter celebrates God opening up and pouring out all



his treasure on humanity! For the great claim is that Jesus' death and resurrection has changed history, our present and our futures. The door to hope and to a different kind of life has been opened, never again to be shut!

Not merely a historical event, Easter celebrates a lifestyle of living in the power of the resurrection. The power of Christ vibrates in us and gives life to us as the power of sin is demolished by the same power that moved the stone.

The tomb is now open! The point of Easter is that God is in the process of clearing this world of all heartbreak. And opening the closed tomb of Jesus is the first step in a campaign to throw open 7 billion doors of hope for people who will trust him. And the implication for our lives is this: If you trust him, your enemies are his enemies and no door of disappointment can close you up in darkness. His endless life puts an end to despair and his triumphant power overwhelms tragedy. So let resurrection glory be your portion, not just on Easter Sunday but every moment you breathe here on earth! Jesus left the tomb for you so that you can now leave your tomb for him!



Bishop's letter.....New life for all the world

Sowing seeds, chitting potatoes, choosing varieties. Easter acts as starter's orders for the gardening year. Beds are cultivated, lawns mown, plans for all the growth and new life that spring and summer will bring made and then turned into action

There's a much greater connection between gardening and Easter than it merely being the time to dust off forks and spades. For in the Bible, a garden is the setting for Easter itself. In John's Gospel (Jn 20:1-18) Mary Magdalene meets the risen Jesus in a garden. Indeed, Jesus's appearance to Mary is so unexpected that at first she can't believe it's really him. So she mistakes the man she meets 'supposing him to be the gardener' (John 20:15).

In John's account, all the new life contained in the first Easter chimes with a much earlier story set in a garden too. This is of the new life of another man and woman, the creation story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden and contained in the book of Genesis (Genesis 2:4- 3:24). In that story, Adam is the gardener (Gen 2:15), only for things to go wrong. In John, Jesus is portrayed as the new Adam – come to bring new life that has no end.

What would happen if we were to think of our churches as gardens, primed to welcome the spring that is the new life of Jesus this Easter? What would happen if we imagined ourselves called to be gardeners – like our father Adam and the new Adam, Jesus? What would we expect to grow? What might need pruning or weeding? What new plans for the coming season would we make and turn into action? What would be the harvest that we'd sow for, tend and then reap?

For I reckon we should see Easter as the starting point of all that God wants to do among us and with us. Jesus's resurrection opens us to being part of God's new creation. Easter offers us a fresh start for life, relationships and the life of our churches: new life for all the world.

Happy gardening and a very Happy Easter to you all.



UDDER FARM


You may remember last month I was writing about the snow and cold weather we have had to deal with in the past. I mentioned about getting the milk away from the farm and the problems that arose from this, luckily then there was a transport centre in Wincanton, the situation now would be very different as the milk from this area goes all over the south west to be bottled or used to manufacture food products, some from this village goes to Davidstow in Cornwall, a long way on a tractor!

Not only did the milk have to be moved but the cattle had to be fed and watered, the feeding in 1978 was not that difficult as the cows could eat their silage straight from the clamp, very few mixer wagons were around then, then an electric fence was put across the face of the clamp and the cows had free access to the silage. The youngstock were mostly fed on small bales of hay and it was quite easy to carry these around and feed them.

Another problem was the freezing temperatures, which meant that a large part of the day was spent going around the water troughs and thawing them so the cattle could drink, this was done mainly by filling watering cans with hot water and pouring onto the pipes, one wasn't that popular walking into the farmhouse with mucky snow on your boots that would thaw as you were waiting for the watering can to fill with hot water in the utility room. Some of the more exposed troughs that were on the outside of buildings had the pipes that fed them covered in rotting manure, which would heat up and keep the incoming water liquid, but the ball taps and the top would still ice up and must be thawed.

When you have got cattle housed you also have to deal with the 2 P's, POO and PEE, the 3rd P is not necessary. These 2 P's freeze as well so the yards get iced over and it is very difficult to scrape it off as is usually done, as the cubicles or housing area are under cover and normally warmer this slurry stays liquid, which doesn't help matters at all as when it is scraped out it just leaves a thicker layer on the outside yard, hopefully if we get low temperatures again with the roof now over all the yards it won't be a problem.

In 1978 we had been warned that there was a high risk of low temperatures, so it was decided to put the then two-wheel drive loader tractor in the shed with the large bucket on the front, so that if any snow needed moving the next day it would be ready. This was a good idea at the time, but that night it snowed and snowed and snowed. The next morning there was a snow drift in front of said tractor that was up over the bonnet. The only way to get it out was to find a shovel and dig it out, luckily for me one of our neighbours, Micheal Livesay, was taking a walk around the village looking at the amount of snow that had fallen. He saw me shovelling snow from in front of the tractor and asked if I would like a hand. I quickly found another shovel and we started to clear the snow, eventually after about an hour the tractor could be got out of the shed. The moral of this story is, that if you see a farmer with a shovel in his hand do not offer to help, because the situation is going to be hard work, he would be using a tractor and hydraulics if he could!!!
