

Matter matters

Spring is in the air and with it comes a sense of renewal and rebirth. As nature starts to awaken after the long winter, Easter serves as a powerful reminder of the opportunity for personal transformation. And the Easter story firmly states



that this transformation is physical, not just spiritual or a glorious metaphor. Jesus' bodily resurrection means that matter matters! This is about a dead body that came back to life.

Had the resurrection been a purely a spiritual event then the physical world loses focus. If salvation concerns only a state of mind, then what does it matter if we feed the hungry or take care of animals or are careful how we use our bodies? If we believe in a God who is eventually going to whisk us away from this evil world and do nothing to set things right, then why waste time building relationships, creating art or fighting global warming?

Belief in the physical resurrection is crucial to Christianity because it offers the reality and possibility of a new kind of human existence. Jesus rose from the dead simply because there was nothing dead about him. There was nothing decaying and impure about him so he could not stay dead. His resurrection says, "What you thought was life is a pallid reflection. See this resurrected body? This is what life is. Real life cannot die."

Jesus stated that he came to give life itself in all its abundance—which by definition is the opposite of death, depression, disease, decay, destruction and poverty. He offers this life to all those who wish to accept it. It is a gift, and like any gift, it can be either accepted or rejected. This historical, physical event, however unpalatable and socially awkward it is, is the hinge of history. Billions of people for the last two thousand years have experienced its transforming power. If you've examined the evidence and you think this astounding miracle really took place in a backwater of the Roman Empire around the year 33 AD, then follow the logic and accept the gift of life that Jesus offers!



Bishop's letter.....Worship is key

In January I was back in my old Diocese of Exeter, marking the death of Sabine Baring Gould 100 years before. What an extraordinary person he was, with an incredible range and roundedness of learning and interests, in an equally full and fulfilled life. He was a great traveller and prolific writer of biographies, folklore, travel books, theology, novels and hymns, including some, such as 'Onward Christian soldiers' that remain popular today. He was a linguist and translator; and, as an archaeologist on Dartmoor, very much a pioneer in the field. For many, his greatest achievement was his collecting the old folk songs of Devon and Cornwall, providing inspiration for such composers as Elgar, Vaughan Williams and Holst. He was also the Squire of Lewtrenchard and, being ordained, he appointed himself as parish priest as well!

This he saw as his true vocation. His responsibility, and that of the local church, was the cure of souls from cradle to grave. This meant a care for the spiritual wellbeing of all in the community and for their bodily and social welfare too. Striving for good health and housing must go hand in hand with growth in faith and prayer. All should be encouraged to full humanity, to holy discipleship, to the recognition, and use, of whatever gifts anyone possessed for the common good.

But, underlying all of this, one other aspect of this great man's life speaks very strongly to me now. That is how he understood worship and its relationship to the whole of life. 'To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God'.

This edition of Manna contains encouraging stories of New Christian Worshipping Communities in Bath and Wells. Worshipping is key. I am reminded of the later words of Archbishop William Temple: 'It is sometimes said that conduct is supremely important, and worship helps it. The truth is that worship is supremely important, and conduct tests it.' Bishop Michael

MEMORIAL HALL COFFEE MORNING

UDDER FARM



Last month and the month before I was telling you about the years in the past that we have had snow. Well apart from one Saturday morning, when there was an inch or two first thing in the morning, it was all gone very quickly and caused no problems, apart from making the ground even wetter.

What has happened in the last month and the previ-

ous months is that it has rained and rained and rained.

I have been asked if it is having any effect on the farm. Well to start with all the cattle were housed a lot earlier than we would have liked, the only good thing about this is that we did have a lot more silage and hay in stock, than we had the previous year. Even though the quality was not so good. This has resulted in the cows not milking as well as we would have liked, which it appears to be the same on most farms.

Another problem is that our slurry store has been filling up quicker than we would have liked, meaning that we have had to take slurry out when the ground conditions have not been the best, which will most probably lead to compaction of the soils and then require rectifying, by aerating the soil with a special machine that puts slots in the ground to aid the compaction and also aid drainage. This will mean more hours going up and down the fields in the tractor, which obviously adds costs.

I was also hoping to tell you about the preparations we are going to make to hopefully be more self-sufficient in-home grown feeds for next winter. But we have not started yet. I will therefor tell you what we should be doing and will be, when the ground dries up a bit.

The first crop that we were hoping to have planted by now was some spring barley, which we will harvest as whole crop, that is we will go into it with the self-propelled harvester and chop the whole plant, the same as we do with the grass. This will then be ensiled in a pit and used to feed the milking cows in the early autumn. This should provide more energy and starch which should be a better balance with the grass silage and save us buying in so much concentrate/ blend to balance the nutrients the cows need. As the seed has already been bought and is in the shed, when or if the rain stops, we will have to get on and plough the fields and then work the soil to get a good seed bed and the hopefully it will germinate and grow.

The other crop that we are going to try and grow again, after a few years of not growing it is forage maize. More about this next month.

We have been thinking about other crops that we might be able to grow in the future if we continue to get as much rain as in the last 6 months. The answer we have come up with is rice. We are also thinking that we might try and breed cows with web feet.

VOLUNTEERS REQUIRED FOR ONE DAY ONLY FOR THE SOMERSCIENCE FESTIVAL ON 6th MAY 2024 CASTLE CARY & SPARKFORD NO SCIENCE KNOWLEDGE NEEDED!

Would you like to help us with this exciting free festival being run for the first time this year on your doorstep in Castle Cary and Sparkford?

We will need 80 volunteers in various roles on the day itself and you can choose whether to be there the whole day (9.30-5.30pm) or half a day (9-1.30 or 1.30-6). Even if you only have 2 hours to spare, we can find a role for you! The roles we need to fill are for event assistants as below and car parking stewards.

The festival comprises 6 venues dotted around Castle Cary and Sparkford. The role you carry out will vary slightly at each because the activities taking place at each are different as follows:

- Market House - talks, workshops and stands, . Needs 4 volunteers, welcoming speakers, visitors, and sorting out any AV issues.

- Haynes Motor Museum - the science fair with around 40 stands, and the stage with performances and talks. **Needs c. 30 volunteers** who will be assisting on some stands, or roving to encourage people to see/understand everything, or at entrance/exit to welcome and encourage feedback or on car park duty.

-Carymoor Environmental Centre - self-contained but will need 2 volunteers to welcome and register visitors - Ansford Academy - workshops for 20-40 visitors and shows for c.150 visitors. Needs 6 volunteers to assist with room set-up between workshops, to welcome visitors and decide when it is full, to be on hand during the workshops and shows and to get feedback at the end.

- **Caryford Hall** – The Health and Bio hub – stands to do with healthcare. **Needs 4 volunteers** to help welcome visitors, help contributors on the stands, manage visitor flow and deal with queries or help in car park.

- Mill On The Brue - self-contained but will need 2 volunteers to welcome and register visitors

SOMERSET COUNCIL March 2024

2024/5 Council Budget: Somerset Council has voted through plans to set a budget for the coming financial year but received a stark warning of significant challenges in the years ahead. LibDem Council Members unanimously agreed a range of measures to bridge a funding gap of £100m for 2024/25, including cost cuttings, increasing Council Tax by 5%, and using £36.8 millions of reserves (a council's equivalent of savings). The proposals also include a 'capitalisation direction' request of £36.9m – seeking permission from Government to borrow money or sell assets to pay for day-to-day running costs. Amid specific plans to cut costs and increase fees, around 1,200 jobs are expected to go at Somerset Council over the next three years equivalent to about a quarter of the workforce. As a result of the cuts some Town Councils have stepped in to save services (CCTV, public toilets etc) but this has resulted in a 179% council tax increase in Taunton, 90% in Yeovil and 164% in Bridgwater.

Council papers are still predicting a further £103 million budget gap in 2025/26.

Gigafactory plans for Puriton site: Agratas, a new business within the Tata Group, has confirmed its plans to build a gigafactory producing EV batteries at the Gravity Smart Campus site in Puriton, near Bridgwater. A £4 billion investment, the factory will create up to 4,000 jobs and many more as part of the supply chain. It is envisioned that the plant will be operational in the second half of the decade, eventually producing 40GWh of battery cells annually, enough to supply approximately 500,000 passenger vehicles. Once fully operational, the factory is set to be Britain's biggest battery factory, and one of the largest in Europe. Over the next five years, Somerset Council plans to invest in the infrastructure, skills, site access and connectivity which will be paid for by the Business Rates generated by the factory once it is operational.

Under the surface exhibition: 'Under the Surface' is an exhibition of photographs by renowned Somerset-based photographer Matilda Temperley, reflecting on 10 years since the devastating floods of 2013-14. It is on display at Somerset Rural Life Museum, Glastonbury from Saturday 2 March to Sunday 19 May. Alongside the exhibition, a programme of events and activities will take place supported by Somerset Rivers Authority (SRA). These include family activities during the Easter Holidays, run in collaboration with the RSPCA and Somerset Wildlife Trust, where visitors can take part in climate-themed craft activities.

Healthy Somerset: A new website has been launched by Public Health to help people in Somerset lead a healthier life. The new site – <u>www.healthysomerset.co.uk</u> –features health and wellbeing resources tailored to all age ranges – making it even easier for users to find the information and support they are looking for. Costing £4.2m the Enterprise Centre has been made possible after successfully securing £1.7m funding from the European Regional Development Fund. Chard Enterprise Centre forms part of a network of workspace services offered by Somerset Council. The Enterprise Centre network aims to offer quality workspace and business support in areas where commercial providers do not operate. There are currently 10 sites across the county and, in addition to Chard, there are centres in Highbridge, Dulverton, Wheddon Cross, Frome, Minehead, Wells, Williton, Wiveliscombe and Bruton.
